Many thanks to all who brought ice cream and treats to the August Ice Cream Social. Also, thanks to the members who brought examples of their recent finds and gave presentations.





More About Mohs

In 1822 a German scientist by the name of Frederick Mohs set up a scale to determine the approximate hardness of minerals. He arranged the minerals in his scale from softest (Talc) to hardest (Diamond). The minerals get increasingly harder as you read down the scale, but they do not increase in hardness at a constant rate. Example: Calcite is not twice as hard as talc and a diamond is not 10 times harder than talc. In fact a diamond is over 40 times harder than talc.

Below is an absolute hardness scale:

- 1 Talc
- 3 Gypsum
- 9 Calcite
- 21 Fluorite
- 48 Apatite
- 72 Orthoclase
- 100 Quartz
- 200 Topaz
- 400 Corundum
- 1600 Diamond

To remember the Mohs scale, try remembering this phrase: The Geologist Can Find An Ordinary Quartz, (that) Tourists Call Diamond!




Beading with Cabochons Class Offered

Sand

Fiber optics and computer chips are made from silicon. Silicon's base component is sand.

Hourglasses and other devices utilizing sand were clocks in Ancient Egypt and in the Middle Ages. The British Navy used hourglasses as late as 1839 for approximate timekeeping. Standard equipment included an hourglass, a half-hour glass, and an eight minute glass. Timing devices using sand are still in common use today; they are used as egg timers and in board games.

In some deserts, sand dunes make mysterious music. Studies show that sand grains in musical dunes are especially smooth. As sand slides down the dune, the motion makes low booming sounds similar to the sounds of drums and bass fiddles.

Sand on the beaches of Florida's Panhandle region sparkles white because it is nearly pure quartz.

There are 85 steps on wood and dirt/gravel stairway up to the Old Priest mine. This may be difficult for some folks with limited leg or lung functions. There is a short walk up the road to the stamp mill. There will be several of us there to assist anybody who needs help getting up and down the stairs. We want everybody to enjoy this rare look into local mining history.

Trip location: Private tour of the Goldbug and Old Priest Mines at the Goldbug City Park in Placerville. If you have taken the walking tour, you will not want to miss this expanded guided tour, well worth the \$15.00 admission. Take Highway 50 east to Placerville, turn left on Bedford Road, go one mile, follow signs on Bedford Rd. to a right turn into the park.

When: Saturday, October 25th at 9AM and 1PM (Two tours to accommodate as many as would like to attend).

Who may attend: All members of CFMS Societies in good standing. North Bay Field Trips Clubs also. Any guest may attend and will not require proof of personal liability insurance for this trip. All must sign a waiver of liability form if they have not signed one at any event this year.

Proposed schedule: Saturday, October 25th, meet at the mine's covered lunch area adjacent to the parking lot and the gift shop building. We will be there at all times to assist you with any information and take your entrance fee and have you sign the consent waiver at 9 AM for the 9:00 tour. And again, at the same location, at 1 PM for the 1:00 tour. If you can arrive a little earlier, that would help in getting the housekeeping done. You can arrange to bring your bag lunch and eat it at the park if you like.

Lodging: There are hotels and motels within minutes of the park if you are traveling from a distance. Check the Placerville Chamber of Commerce web site for hotel listings.

Tools: No tools required. Cameras are permitted and encouraged.

Fees: \$15.00 cash or check made out to "Strike it Rich Tours".

Safety Concerns: Tour guides will make you aware of any hazards on the tour and therefore, pay close attention to them and follow their instructions.



Climate and Weather:

Other than normal fall weather, most of the tour is inside the mines and the stamp mill. Should there be a chance of rain predicted, you may wish to bring an umbrella.

Other Remarks: Since this is a City Park, there is no collecting of any rock, plants, or animals from this site. This private tour was given to our Rookie Rock Rollers and we found it absolutely incredible. The feast of information about the history of the mines, the geology of the mines, and the methods and culture of the miners was far beyond the value of the \$15.00 admission fee. The panning for gold was better than that of most do-it-yourself mining opportunities.

Fancy Sapphires

Corundum that is red is ruby, but when it is discovered any other color it is sapphire. Although most people tend to think of sapphire as being blue, it actually comes in a kaleidoscope of colors. Besides blue, their hues can be orange-pink, pink, orange, yellow, golden, purple, green, white and color change.

Gemology

With a hardness of 9, sapphires are extremely tough and durable and suitable for use in any kind of jewelry. It is the hardest gemstone type known except diamond. All corundum is a common natural mineral, aluminum oxide. What is rare are the small trace elements of titanium, iron, chromium and vanadium which create the various colors in fancy sapphires.

Padparadscha (pronounced pahd-puh-rah-zhuh)

The rarest and most valuable collector fancy sapphire is the padparadscha, which is Sinhalese for "lotus flower." A true padparadscha must display a combination of both orange and pink colors. These colors should blend so that it is difficult to see where the pink stops and the orange begins. Dealers disagree on the exact ideal color of a padparadscha. Tone and origin are crucial factors in determining what truly constitutes this gem. We believe the term should be limited to the light to medium tones of Sri Lankan (Ceylon) sapphires with a color that is similar to salmon. Some unscrupulous dealers have been selling African fancy sapphires as padparadscha. However, these stones have too much

orange-brown to be properly labeled "pads." Sri Lankan padparadscha sapphires sell at a premium. An unheated gem padparadscha will range between \$4000-\$10,000 per carat. Large gems can exceed these prices. Padparadschas are hot collector items and are bought up as quickly as they are found.

Pink

The second most valuable fancy sapphire is "electric" or "bubble gum" pink. The best of these gems have a pure vibrant and vivid pink color. What makes these stones exceptional is an electric intensity and a tone that pushes them way above a pastel color. Dealers, gem organizations and collectors argue about where to draw the line between ruby and pink sapphire. One problem with grading these stones is the color pink is basically a light or desaturated red. On the AGL grading system, there is a transition point for pink sapphire/ruby. If the stone is redder than this point, it is called a ruby. If the stone is less red, it is a pink sapphire. The main sources of these gems are Burma, Sri Lanka, and Madagascar. Most of the heated pinks on the market today are from Madagascar and sell from \$200-\$1000 per carat. Unheated gem Burma pinks sell from \$1500-\$3000 per carat. Large multi-carat sized Burma pinks can exceed \$4000 per carat.
