If you are not a subscriber to the *Rock and Gem* magazine, I would encourage you to take a look at an edition or two I'll bring to the meeting. As Bob Jones points out, they are about the only periodical left in the industry that caters to the rockhounds/lapidaries. Since most of you joined the Roseville Rock Rollers to "learn" more about rocks and minerals and the lapidary arts, I would bet that you would find this magazine a major resource. I mention this, because *Rock and Gem* is going way out of their way to meet the needs of the modern rockhound and gem and mineral societies.

People ask me how I know so many details about rocks and minerals. While I have attended some college courses, my main stock of information comes from rock and mineral shows, talking to vendors, rock and mineral seminars, (such as those at Tucson and the CFMS shows), and the *Rock and Gem* magazine. Bob Jones is an incredible resource and writes at least one, sometimes two articles a month on some aspect of mineralogy and geology. Bob writes in a manner that allows the average rockhound to understand the subject, but also throws in enough technical stuff to hold the interest of the geologist and mineralogist. Bob Jones won't be with us forever, so it is wise to take advantage of his incredible knowledge base while he is glad to share it. The *Rock and Gem* also lists the upcoming shows across America, including ours, and for free! They also have an on-line list of gem and mineral societies and their contact information. This would be handy if you are spending time on vacation in another part of the country and would have time to stop in at one of their meetings.

Another periodical is the *Mineralogical Record*. This magazine is a little above the average rock hounds area of interest, but is a coffee table type magazine and goes into great depth on a region or specific mineral. Every aspect of chemistry and crystallography are discussed on the minerals of that region or mineral type. It is also a little pricey and only comes every other month.



From the President's Pen, cont'd

(Topaz Mt., Utah)

You may notice in the minutes that the RRR will be hosting a 2009 CO-OP field trip to Topaz Mt. While the date is not firm yet, we are looking at April, possibly around Easter break. You might want to put a note in your calendar to consider some vacation time to get to this very interesting site. I am hoping to cover a two weekend period to allow for folks to meet on either weekend, and spread out during the week also.

This trip would be a major investment for most of you coming from the Central Valley. It would take about 10 to 12 hours driving time to get to the site, and may require a day and half travel time for those with RV's who drive the exact speed limit. There will be a list of accommodations in Delta Utah, about 45 minutes from the Topaz Mt. site. There are several hotels, and a good size RV Park in town. Camping is permitted up to 14 days on the BLM land in and around the mountain. I will be camping in the "Cove" in the heart of the mountain.

We will be chasing the elusive Red Emeralds, Champagne colored Topaz crystals and crystal clusters, and spend at least one day out at the Dugway Geode (thunder egg) beds. The Red Emerald zone is in a precarious place high up on the hill, surrounded by loose talus and is not suitable for young people, nor fragile folks. There are topaz collection sites at the base of the hill for those who may not be willing, or able, to scale the side of the hill.

This will be a Mega Trip for those who are game. If you are camping at the Mt., you will need to be fully self contained as there is no water or campsite services of any sort. The road is paved all the way to the last mile into the cove area, and 2 wheel drives can make it in all the way. The weather is goofy at that time of year, and can be freezing cold or blazing hot!


We wanted to get this out to you as soon as possible to give you plenty of time to ask questions, prepare for time off, and get excited about this site. I have been there about eight times, and chased the emeralds for about ten days in 100 + heat during one trip, two days after it snowed 1/4 of an inch. There is a great deal of information on-line about Topaz Mt. and there is a great little book with excellent pictures modified with directions to the various collection areas for some of the other exotic mineral specimens found in the mountain. See you at the meeting in November!

The Gold Bug by Jim Barton

"The Gold-Bug," a short story by Edgar Allan Poe, involves deciphering a secret message and finding buried treasure. The Gold Bug Mine in Placerville, El Dorado County, CA also has secrets to reveal and once held treasures of nature.

Thanks to the efforts of the organizers, RRR President Jim Hutchings, with Frank and Rich Dvoracek of Strike It Rich Tours, members of four clubs of the CO-OP and East Bay Field Trip organizations enjoyed a field trip into the world of hard rock and placer gold mining.

Forty one individuals, divided into three groups, rotated between the gold (and gemstone) panning troughs (Jim), the Priest Mine (Frank), and the Gold Bug Mine (Rich). Jim showed us his technique for panning, some literature on gold, his mining tools, and his samples of ore and jewelry.

Frank told us the Priest Mine was one of the first hand-dug mines during the Gold Rush, and was owned by a man named Bishop. We were shown the quartz vein in the walls and ceiling of the mine and the fault that the fluid quartz followed, told how to determine if gold was present (clear or white, bad quartz; rusty red or yellow, good quartz), and shown a stope (shaft started from the bottom) that was used as an air shaft for the Priest Mine

and later connected to the Gold Bug Mine.

Rich met us at the Gold Bug Mine, and explained why the entrance needed timbers (erosion) while the remaining timbers inside the tunnel were fluff for the tourist trade. He also explained that the Gold Bug, a dry mine, was used to store explosives for use in another mine.

Rich identified the rocks as slate, mica schist and talc schist that originally were deposited as flat layers of sediment on an ancient sea floor, metamorphosed by heat and pressure after burial, and tilted upright by tectonic action. He also demonstrated single jacking, a technique for drilling holes for explosives, and how to light fuses and get out of the mine safely.

After everyone had a turn at each location, we were invited to hike up to the "8-stamp" mill on the hill, which is a conglomeration of parts from other stamp mills and originally ran on water power. As a community stamp mill, other miners brought their ore there for processing.

It was a trip that my family and I enjoyed immensely as we learned to decipher secrets of mining and found treasures of nature. The gold, garnets, and sapphires that we panned will give us fond memories of our day in California's Gold Country.



Be a SHOW-Off! March 28-29, 2009 by Terry Yoschak

You have a collection of something, whether it's geodes or crystals, cabochons or jewelry, fossils or volcanic rocks. You need to **SHOW YOUR COLLECTION AS AN EXHIBIT** at the Rock Rollers Show in March! There is no better way to brag about your hard work in the field or your expertise in the shop.

ALL YOU NEED is your collection (choose only your best items), fabric to lay it on, and labels to identify it. The Rock Rollers have display cases with lighting that you can use.

Can't picture how much room a display case has for your items? A general rule is that the length of a display case is about the same as the length of **A STANDARD SIZE BATH TOWEL** -- 44 inches. Lay a bath towel on a table or a workbench and arrange your items on it, and you can see how much room you will have in a case. You would need fabric about that length to cover the bottom of the case. A neutral-colored (beige or light gray) stretch-knit fabric is best. Do not use velvet, since heavy objects placed on it will cause permanent marks. If you need to buy fabric, take a few of your specimens to the store and see how they look on the fabric, before you buy.

If you want more than a flat display on the floor of the case, make a "riser," a form under the cloth which lifts it up toward the back of the case. **A RISER** can be made from wood or Styrofoam or cardboard or anything - no one will know what it's made from, if it is effectively covered with your fabric. Empty boxes are good as risers. Don't ever throw out that box your computer keyboard came in, because that would serve as an excellent flat riser for specimens.

LABELS are important also! Mineral or fossil specimens should be labeled to describe what they are and where they originated ("Agate, Montana"). Crafted and lapidary items should indicate their mineral roots -- people will know it's a necklace or a cabochon and that it's green, but what is it made from? Malachite? Jade? Aventurine?

Labels should be neat and readable. And don't forget a label with **YOUR NAME** on it. I've seen many beautiful displays with no one's name in the case, leaving me to wonder why they didn't want credit for their wonderful work!
