A Roseville Rock Rollers Field Trip to Duncan Canyon

Sunday, July 22, 2012

TRIP LOCATION: Duncan Canyon, Placer County CA., Above Foresthill

WHEN: Sunday, July 22nd, 2012, 9AM meet at the Hutchings house in Foresthill.

MEMBERS' GUESTS: This is a private mining claim owned by the Hutchings family and is located in the Tahoe National Forest. This is a joint outing with the Sacramento Chapter of the Gold Prospectors Association of America and RRR members and their guests are allowed. Participants and their guests will need to sign a hold harmless waiver on arrival at the meeting site. Guests will not be required to present personal liability insurance.

COLLECTION MATERIAL: Panning, sluicing, and crevicing for gold. Fishing, photography, and an interesting trek into the deep woods of old growth forests of the Sierra Nevada.

PROPOSED SCHEDULE: Meet in Foresthill at 9 AM, depart by 9:30. 45 minute drive time to the parking site. 20 minute hike into the canyon. Depart when you would like to, but dark comes early in the canyon. It is recommended that you start out by 6 PM. The only trail in and out is clear and well traveled, and takes you back to the parking area. When leaving, you must stop by and let Jim know you are leaving. You will not be hiking out to your car for lunch, so pack in your lunch and snacks. A water pump will be available at the camp to filter the very clean mountain water for refilling your water container.

MEET: 6109 Oakley Lane in Foresthill

DIRECTIONS TO MEET: From Hwy 80 Eastbound, take the Foresthill/Auburn Ravine off-ramp. Take a right turn at the end of the ramp and cross Lincoln way through the lighted intersection. Set odometer and follow Foresthill Road down across the Foresthill high bridge over the American River Canyon, and 15 miles to Oakley Lane on the right, just past Madrone and Pond on your left. If you pass the US Forest Service Station or the Wortons Market, you went too far. If you are running late, cell service is unreliable past the bridge, so call from the bridge and we will wait for you. Please make yourself available prior to departure for convoy instructions. Pay close attention to directions for keeping the convoy together so as to not lose anybody. You should arrive at the house with sufficient gas to make the roughly 50 mile round trip.

CAMP/FACILITIES: There are no facilities at the park-

ing site or the mining camp. You should carry toilet paper and the Forest Service will require that you carry a zip lock bag for removal of human waste from the forest. Last chance for a flush toilet is at the meet site.

TOOLS: Gold pan if you have one, some are available to borrow. Sluice box and bucket, if you are capable of carrying it in and out. Some are available to borrow. Small trowel, screw driver or thin bladed scraping tools for getting material out of crevices. Small brush and metal sheet formed into a dust pan for



brushing down the bare bedrock of small fine gold. Small vial or film canister for holding gold. Large zip lock bag for carrying out concentrates from sluicing operations. There are large pry bars at the mining site for the occasional large rock that needs to be moved, no need to carry a large bar in and out. Pack light, it is a long trip out with a heavy pack. Fishing poles and eggs or spinners if you plan to fish. A frying pan and olive oil are available at the camp if you snag one and want to eat it there.

SAFETY CONCERNS: THIS IS NOT A THEME PARK, IT IS NOT A DUDE RANCH! It is a working placer gold mine in a remote and wild part of the Tahoe National Forest! The road is a dusty, part gravel, part paved, brush lined logging road. Large bodied vehicles may get brush scratches. Vehicles, low to the ground, need to navigate around rocks and wood chunks in the road to avoid damage. Any vehicle can make this trip otherwise. Those not in reasonably good health or with heart, leg, and backs issues should not attempt this trip. Children of most any age will not have problems hiking in on this trail. Parents should not bring children that need to be carried in and out. Snakes, bears, and cats live in these woods, but are rarely seen. Ticks and poison oak are found at the trail head and on the first half of the trail, but not so much at the stream. Wet slippery rocks, heavy rocks squashing fingers, and slipping and falling on the trail are all possible hazards. Children should be closely monitored and not allowed to climb the canyon walls or rock walls as these are unstable and could bring rocks down on them or others. The stream is generally shallow and not running strong or dangerously. The water is very cold. Bug spray is essential. The snow mosquito is a vicious and hungry bug! While they are not a problem at the stream, they are on the trail and at the parking area. You will need spray the minute you get out of the car! You will want between 27% and 100% DEET bug spray. Leave the wussy organic crap home and bring real bug spray for the hike in and have it available for the hike out.

CLIMATE & WEATHER: While it may be very warm in the valley, the steep walls of the canyon allow for plenty of shaded areas to work to avoid direct sunlight. If the weather in the valley is lower than 80 degrees, it could be very cool in the mornings and afternoon in the canyon. Hiking out later in the day will make for a more pleasant trip out than in the heat of the day.

A "CO-OP MEMBER" FIELD TRIP TO EAST OF AUSTIN, NV

- This trip is open to all rockhounds who agree to abide by the AFMS Code of Ethics, the directions of the field trip leader and practice safe rockhounding.
- Call the field trip leader beforehand to sign up and for further information.
- Remember to wear your name badge and sign in with the field trip leader.

- A Consent and Assumption of Risk Waiver of Liability form must be signed upon arrival at meeting site.
- All non-CFMS members must provide proof of personal liability insurance (homeowners or renters). Please contact the field trip leader before the field trip for insurance requirements.

FIELD TRIP: Our September field trip will be to Jade Cove, south of Big Sur. We will be looking for Nephrite Jade. It can be found along the shoreline. You can come up for the day or join us camping overnight. Day use free by side of road, camping \$22.00. No electric hookups. 45 campsites half are assigned on a first come, first served basis. You now can reserve your campsite. 8 persons per site. Each site has a picnic table, grill and fire pit. Flush toilet restrooms and water nearby. **Saturday night at 6pm there will be a potluck dinner.**

MEETING: Friday/Saturday 9am-4pm. Sunday afternoon. We will meet at Robert’s campsite #030. There will be a short briefing of the sites. We will be going to Jade Cove, Sand Dollar Beach, Willow Creek, Please remember to sign a release form to participate in the field trip. From Placket Creek camp to Jade Cove we will then

drive south on Hwy 1 half a mile to a long pull out on right side (west) with an entrance to Jade cove. In the surf and along shore Jade can be found amongst the other rocks.

MATERIAL: Nephrite Jade, Serpentine, Actinolite, Soap Stone, Abalone shells. **TOOLS:** Collecting bags, buckets, day pack, digging tools, rock pick, pry bar, eye protection, trowels, hand rake, hat, sunglasses, sunscreen, sturdy shoes, rubber boots or old tennis shoes, layered clothing, towels, change of clothes/shoes in case you get wet. Drinking water, lunch or snacks, camping gear if you plan on spending the night. (The main tools to use are simple garden tools, a hand trowel and hand rake).
