Vice President's Corner

Mineral Cleaning

I went on the Pilliken Mine field trip at the beginning of March with my son, and we had a lot of fun. Field Trip Leader Gordon Standlee showed us what we were looking for, and, for the most part, it was everywhere! It was a great trip! When I got home, I had some specimens that needed cleaning, and in fact they still do, because I haven't gotten to it yet; but I thought cleaning might make a good article.

The best method for cleaning most minerals is simply to wash them off with water. Of course this doesn't apply to minerals that dissolve in water such as halite or hanksite. Keep these well away from water! Most things, though, look a lot better with a simple rinse. If there are some little crevices or corners, a soft toothbrush or even a water pick can help get the water where it needs to go.

The next thing I would try, and the most I've had to do for my specimens, is a product you can buy at a big box store in the cleaning aisle called Iron Out. Mix it with water and soak your specimen in it for 20-30 minutes and then soak again in plain water for another 15-20 minutes and your rust stained specimens will look brand new.

There are other cleaning processes that use acids. Most people could handle an oxalic acid bath, and many could work with muriatic acid, but if your specimen needs to be cleaned with hydrochloric acid make sure you know what you are doing. If it needs hydrofluoric acid, seek the assistance of a professional; that stuff is extremely dangerous.

Fortunately, as I mentioned, most people will be satisfied with the results of water cleaning, unless you accidentally try to wash off that dusty halite that's been sitting on the shelf... trust me, you won't be happy with that result.

New Business


Volunteering at CFMS show in Sept. in Placerville. Florence will contact Chair Barbara Terrill and let her know RRR would like to offer assistance.
