The Uncommon Smith

Ask any American for the most common name in our country and most will tell you "Smith" – or maybe "Jones". The English name "Smith" or "Smyth" is derived from the ancient feudal practice of surnaming someone according to their profession. "Tom the Baker", "Allister the Cook", "Martin the Milner", and "Angela the Cartwright" are just a few examples.

It seems that once upon a time there must have been a lot of Smiths [or a few who were very prolific!] in order for there to be such a plethora of them now. But sadly today they are, with very few exceptions, "Smiths" only in name. Smithing in its various forms is a dying art, practiced by very few, no matter what their surname might be.

Call to Order at 7:00 p.m. by President Teresa Johnson.
Present: all officers except Carole Lockhart, Karla Shannon and Steve Smith. Guest: Glenn Fiala.
Minutes – a motion was MSA to approve the minutes for the May 24, 2016 Bd. Mtg.; for the June 14, 2016 Ed. Mtg.; for the July 13, 2016 Ed. & Bd. Mtgs.; for the Aug. 9, 2016 Ed. & Bd. Mtgs.; and for the Sept. 13, 2016. Ed. & Bd. Mtgs.
Treasurer – Terry Yoschak reported the CFMS Directors and Officers Insurance was paid (\$275).
Correspondence – Florence Brady reported no correspondence.
Membership – 283 members. Membership renewals will start in October.

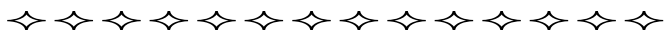

Rookie Rock Roller News



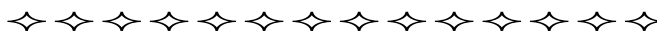
The Rookies will meet in the lapidary shop at 5:30 p.m. on October 11, 2016.

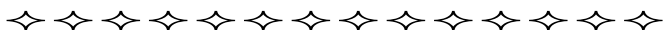

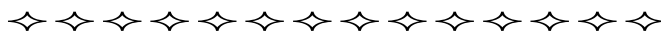

Campaign to Buy a New Rock Saw for the Lapidary Shop

It has been brought to the attention of the club's Board that the rock saw in the lapidary shop works satisfactorily at best. There is also concern for safety of personnel due to the design of the rock saw. For this reason it has been voted to pursue a purchase of a new rock saw. As most of you know a rock saw is not a cheap purchase.

There are a number of choices to select from and they are all similar in design but vary greatly in pricing. The idea is to purchase an 18" saw that is priced as low as \$3,100 and priced as high as \$4,200, and this is without taxes and shipping included. As mentioned this is not an inexpensive venture to pursue. So how are we going to raise this kind of money?

The goal is to raise the funds necessary through the following means:

- Donations: These can be cash donations or items (to be explained further below).
- Silent Auction: During our monthly education meeting there will be a section (separated from the existing silent auction) of items that will be auctioned off and the funds will go to the new rock saw fund.

This is where the items donated will come into play. Bring in your unwanted jewelry that you made, even cabochons that you just can't get around to do anything with, slabs that do not interest you any longer, or plain old rocks that you just cannot seem to get around to cutting.

The auction will display a picture of the rock saw we are planning to purchase, and the total funds raised will be reported each month.

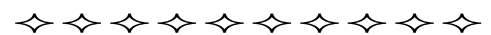

cle can take it. Once we leave the campground it is about 2 miles to the summit but only high clearance vehicles will make it up.

VEHICLE REQ'S - To get to the summit will require a high clearance vehicle that has 4 wheel drive. The road is fairly good but because trees have fallen across the road and only enough trunk has been removed to allow vehicles like Jeeps, Broncos, Blazers, etc. to pass easily. I accessed the site in a Dodge Ram dual cab pickup but the length of the vehicle made it difficult. There may be some space in the vehicles that I have going but it is up to you to verify you have a ride to the top if you do not have a vehicle as I described.

CAMP/FACILITIES - Mokelumne River Campground has camp sites with tables and toilet facilities.
