October, the beginning of Fall and another birthstone, the Opal. The name, "Opal" means "to see a change in color." When pure it's colorless, but this is rare or maybe to put the record straight, it's unheard of. The impurities in them are what give the Opal the shades of colors they have which range from blue to red. Another form of opal, known as fire opal, is transparent with orange and red colors and flicks of yellow, but the most valuable are that of the black opals, which showcase one or more colors against a background of black. Opal is mainly found in Australia, where ninety-five percent of the world's black and white opals are mined. They are also found in Hungary, Brazil, Mexico, the United States and Canada.

Here are just a few meanings/facts of the Opal:

1. The gift of an Opal symbolizes confidence and faithfulness and can be used to ward off nightmares. Just don't give it to someone *not* born during October, otherwise it can be a token of bad luck. (Maybe that explains my nightmares, but I can't give up my Opals!!)

2. The ancient Romans considered it a symbol of hope, loyalty, happiness, innocence and purity. A Roman scholar in 75AD summed up the beautiful opal saying: "Some opals carry such a play within them that they equal the deepest and richest colors of painters. He marveled that this kaleidoscopic gem encompassed the red of ruby, the green of emerald, the yellow of to-paz, the blue of sapphire, and the purple of amethyst." This is why the Opal

- **Present**: all officers except for Stan Bollinger, Rene' Hunerlach and Carole Lockhart. Two guests, Denise Coyne and Jim Barton.
- Minutes a motion was MSA to approve the minutes for Bd. Mtg. June 26, 2018; Ed. & Bd. Mtgs. July 10, 2018; Ed. & Bd. Mtgs. August 14, 2018 and Ed. Mtg. Sept. 11,

2018.

- **Treasurer** Terry Yoschak received and paid the bill for the lumber used to move the saw shed. Discussed the rental fee at the storage lot for the show trailer. It was decided to start paying the rental fees by the month. This will take effect starting Nov. 1st. (\$99/mo.)






Care and Feeding of Your Opal

- Wear it often it likes to breathe. Touch it often. It likes contact with the skin. the natural oils in your skin keeps the opal "moist" and lustrous. (Contrary to popular belief, true Australian opal is not porous and will not absorb contamination in perspiration or other bodily moisture.)
- Do not wash dishes, clothes or other items with it on. Opals contain water. The harsh detergents in dish or laundry soaps can "dry" out the stone.
- Do not wear opals in any type of hot tub, Jacuzzi, swimming pool, sauna, steam room, bath tub or shower. Exposure to long submersion in any water with or without detergents or chemicals will destroy opals.
- Do not garden with it on. Continuous contact with the soil can abrade the surface of your stone.
- Do not clean your opal jewelry with an ultrasonic device. Use plain water and a nonabrasive pad or facial soap.
- Do not store your opal in oil or glycerin.





Robots Land on Asteroid, Will Bring Home Space ROCKS!

This weekend (September 16) Japan made history by deploying two rovers on the surface of a near-Earth asteroid. The mechanical explorers dropped from their mothership, Hayabusa2, less than 100 meters above the asteroid Ryugu, and now they are hopping across the space rock's cratered landscape. This picture was taken by Rover-1A in mid-hop:

Hopping is necessary because the asteroid's gravity is too weak for simple rolling. Instead of wheels, the rovers have rotating motors inside that allow them to shift their momentum and, thus, make little jumps across the asteroid's rugged surface. Mission controllers are taking great care that the rovers, which measure 18 cm by 7 cm and weigh only 1 kg, do not fly into space.

As historic as this achievement is, it is only the beginning: Rover-1A and 1B are on a reconnaissance mission for two more robots slated to land later this year. In October, Hayabusa2 will release MASCOT (Mobile Asteroid Surface Scout), a larger lander made by the German Aerospace Center. MASCOT will be followed, in turn, by another Japanese robot.

Exploring Ryugu is important. Classified as a potentially hazardous asteroid, this 900-meter wide space rock can theoretically come closer to our planet than the Moon. This makes it a potential target for asteroid mining. Hayabasa2 will discover what valuable metals may be waiting there. Ryugu is also a very primitive body, possibly containing a chemical history of the formation of our solar system billions of years ago.

Launched in December 2014, Hayabusa2 reached asteroid Ryuga in June of

this year. It is scheduled to orbit the asteroid for about a year and a half before returning to Earth in late 2020, carrying samples of Ryugu for analysis by researchers. Stay tuned for updates!

A Blast from the Past (This article appeared in our bulletin exactly 17 years ago — Editor)

ROSEVILLE ROCK ROLLERS PROFILE

James Hutchings is one of the newest members of the Roseville Rock Rollers. He brings with him a wealth of information and experience. He is a most interesting man. Jim is married and has five children, most of whom are grown. He is a Sergeant in the California Highway Patrol, Protective Services Division. His primary work duties arc providing all phases of protection for the State Capitol. Jim was previously a member of the California State Police and has been in law enforcement for over twenty-five years.

Outside of work, Jim's interests include operating his ham radio, cultivating a large vegetable garden, dredging for gold and looking for rocks. His father, who was also a state police officer, would visit various California mines in his job. He would frequently bring home some rocks. Equipped with a Golden Book and rock hammer, young Jim took an interest in rocks as well. Sgt. Hutchings really honed his knowledge with a mineral identification class he took at Sierra College a few years ago.

Today, Jim dredges for gold on his claim, located on a tributary in the Middle Fork of the American River. He is a member of the Gold Prospectors Association of America. Jim also spends a lot of his free time searching for rocks, minerals and other collectible items in California, Nevada and other states. With a metal detector, he has found gold and other minerals, and acquired an extensive collection of cans and bottles from old mining camps. When he goes out, he likes to spend four to five days intensely working an area in search of good specimens. This obviously accounts for his impressive collection of topaz and red beryl found at Topaz Mountain in Utah. Through diligent effort, he has also found emeralds around an old mine near Lovelock, Nevada.

In the past five years, Sgt. Hutchings has also taken up lapidary to use some of the beautiful rocks and gems he has found. He has turned rocks in to cabochons and cabochons into necklaces, earrings and other jewelry for his

family and himself. Other wearable art has been fashioned out of his gold finds.

In his current explorations, Jim is pursuing meteorites. He has now learned of a meteorite site in El Dorado County, from 1876.
