July 4 & 5 Show Write-up!

Well, we pulled that off. As more and more shows are cancelled into the fall due to uncertainty, it does appear, we may be one of the only shows standing this year. Thank you all so much for sticking this out with me. I know it seemed a little crazy in the year of the COVID, to even try, but I could not imagine taking the financial hit if there was any chance that we could hold a show and avoid the loss.

We had several goals. One was to liquidate our contract with the Grounds. Had we failed to pick a date before the end of the year, we could have lost our facility fee of around \$15,000 dollars. If we failed to hold a show, we would have felt obligated to refund the \$18,000 or so we took in from our yendors.

A second goal was driven by the fact, that without holding a show and generating some revenue, we would have had to dig into our savings to cover the \$10,000 to \$12,000 in operating costs for our shop, meetings, pot lucks, and other programs. We were able to do that.

What an amazing thing you all accomplished. With just one walk through, in a building we had never even visited, you put together a proposed plan for layouts. On top of that, we had to account for very significant COVID mitigation elements. The experience we all have had in putting shows on in the past, and the assistance of Show Chairs that could not be with us at the show, allowed us to get this thing up and running.

The third goal was to actually hold a show, where vendors could vend and buyers could buy, and the Rose-

ville Rock Rollers could show off what we do. We did that. I think we got about a dozen membership requests. The vendors are ever so grateful for us holding this show. They were able to buy and sell among themselves. While attendance was half of our last year's show, it appears it was the half that were the serious buyers who brought money. Keep in mind, we were also amidst an eco-

nomic crises with 5 million Californian's out of work. It was also a holiday weekend, where folks escaped to the hills to camp, and many had family get-togethers to celebrate the 4th, since there were no community fireworks displays. I did not talk to any vendor who stated that they did not make money at this show. I do know of at least 5 vendors who made more money at this show than any show in the past. Every new replacement vendor begged to be able to join us next year.

It will not be necessary to hold an after show meeting, as it is unlikely, we will be using this building next year, nor will we be confronted with the issues that the COVID outbreak created for us, hopefully. As such, we would like to document your thoughts on what went well, what went wrong, what could be done better, es-

pecially if it applies to our regular show in March next year. You can email me directly at

Show Vendor Comments

Let me tell you about the Roseville show that was held at the Placer Event Center at The Grounds (formerly called the Placer County Fairgrounds).

When I was contacted by the Roseville club and told their show had been rescheduled for the July 4th weekend, I thought they were nuts, but the show chairman told me about the venue: the Placer Event Center is a brand new, state of the art facility designed as a sports complex, easily able to hold dozens of basketball or volleyball courts. The ceiling is three stories high and the air system is also brand new. I was told that there would be more space between dealers than I've ever seen.



They delivered on every promise. There were about 40 dealers inside and a number of outside dealers as well. Free masks were given out to the public and all of the dealers and a good 95% of the customers kept their masks on all of the time. Attendance was about 1/2 of normal,

but the people who came, were serious about buying. There was also a lot of dealer to dealer sales. Most of the dealers I spoke with were quite satisfied that they made a good decision doing the show.

Now for the best news: I've talked to several of the dealers who were there and I talked with the show chairman yesterday: Zero reports of anyone getting sick.

A RRR FIELD TRIP to Crystal Mine near Verdi, NV, August 22, 2020

TRIP LOCATION – Crystal Mine. Near Verdi, NV.

TRIP DIFFICULTY RATING SCALE

Vehicle Access & Parking - #7 - Difficult access by 2 wheel drive, high clearance required (2 and 4 wheel SUVs, or trucks recommended).

Collection or View Site - #6 - ½ to ½ mile with trails on hill sides, or through brush and creek beds

WHEN – Saturday, August 22, 2020.

MEMBER'S GUESTS - Allowed.

COLLECTION MATERIAL – Quartz Crystals.

LEADER & CONTACT INFO – Gene Doyle: 408-605-9457; eugene.doyle@sbcglobal.net.

PROPOSED SCHEDULE – We will meet in front of Verdi Elementary School at 10am. We will leave for Crystal Mine at 10:30am.

MEET - I will be parked on Bridge St. on the right side of the road.

DIRECTIONS TO SITE – Take Highway I-80 East to Verdi, NV. Take Exit 2, drive about 0.5 mi. to 3rd St. Turn right onto 3rd St, drive about 1.0 mi. and turn left onto Bridge St. Drive 0.2 mi. to the Verdi Elementary School, on your right.

VEHICLE REQ'S – High clearance 2 or 4 wheel SUV or truck recommended.

CAMP/FACILITIES – Due to Covid-19 the local camp grounds are currently closed.

TOOLS –Buckets, rock hammer, chisels, eye and hand protection.

SAFETY CONCERNS – 7,200 ft. elevation, sun exposure, and snakes.

CLIMATE/WEATHER – Typical August weather. The temperature/weather can vary due to the high elevation.

CLOTHING – Wear layered clothing, hats, and gloves, and boot. Wear sun screen protection.

OTHER REMARKS – This is the perfect trip for someone just getting started in collecting rocks in the field. You can find quality quartz crystals with a bit of digging. Bring a camera, this is an area for good pictures.

A RRR FIELD TRIP to Garnet Hill, CA September 20, 2020

TRIP LOCATION – Garnet Hill in Calaveras Co., CA., east of Hams Station.

TRIP DIFFICULTY RATING SCALE:

Vehicle Access & Parking - # 5 - 2 wheel, vehicle parking on rough terrain or trail end.

Collection or View Site - #7 - ½ mile or **more** to site, difficult trails and ravines or water crossings. Potential exploration for additional sites.

WHEN - Sunday, September 20, 2020

SPONSOR CLUB – Roseville Rock Rollers Gem & Mineral Society

LEADER & CONTACT INFO – RRR Field Trip Leader, Gene Doyle, (408) 605-9457

MEMBER'S GUESTS – Friends and family welcome.

COLLECTION MATERIAL – Collection materials will be mainly Andradite Garnets and Epidote crystals.

PROPOSED SCHEDULE – We will be hiking up to the top of Garnet Hill following forest rte. 7N08. The walking time is about an hour (at a moderate pace). We will pace ourselves depending on how people are doing. We will be climbing 1155 ft in 1.8 miles in about an hour. With walking time of an hour each way and four hours looking for minerals. Aside from travel time to the starting point off of Ellis Rd, 6 hours of time should be devoted to this trip.

MEET – Park and meet to the left after crossing the bridge over Mokelumne River from Salt Springs Reservoir Rd. at 9am. I will park alongside a wood fence with a "Roseville Rockrollers" sign on the Side of my car before 9:00 am where we are to start. We will then leave the meeting area at 9:30 am.

DIRECTIONS TO SITE – Traveling Eastbound on Highway 88 about 4.2 miles past Hams Station, turn left at Ellis Rd. (at Grizzly Flats). Head Southeast on Ellis Rd. toward Salt Springs Rd. for 1.9 miles. Turn Right to stay on Ellis Rd. for 9.5 miles. Turn right onto Forest Rte. 7N08 for 200 feet.

VEHICLE REQ'S – High clearance 2 wheel car, SUV, or Truck recommended.

CAMP/FACILITIES – No nearby bathroom facilities. There are three camp site facilities nearby. You will have to check online for camping costs. There is one (*Continued on page 6*)

camp site near where we will be parking which might be open.

TOOLS – Rock hammer, small pry bar, chisel, small hand slug hammer, collecting bucket, small shovel. Might want to have a backpack or rolling bucket/ wagon/canvas bag type carrier.

SAFETY CONCERNS – Watch out for rattlesnakes and poison oak. Bring suntan lotion and mosquito repellent.

CLIMATE/WEATHER – Typical September weather for this area, cold in the morning and warm to hot in the afternoon.

CLOTHING - Wear hat, Jacket/Raincoat, and shirt with sleeves, long pants, and boots.

FOOD – Bring water, snacks and/or lunch.

OTHER REMARKS - Bring a camera if you want to take some beautiful pictures.



Rockhound Baking at Home

Dirt Cake

1 large pkg of Oreo cookies

8 oz cream cheese

1 cup powdered sugar

4 Tbsp margarine or butter

2 small (3 1/2 oz) pkg instant vanilla pudding

4 cups of milk

12 oz Cool Whip

Beat pudding and milk according to the package instructions until thick. Add the Cool Whip to the pudding and refrigerate. Blend the butter, cream cheese and sugar together and set aside. Crush Oreo cookies in a blender. (It works best if you crumble the cookies first before putting them in the blender). Mix 1/2 of the Oreo cookie crumbs with the cream cheese mixture and pudding mixture. Pour into an 8 inch flower pot or bowl. Top the rest of the mixture in the bowl with the remaining cookie crumbs. Serve with a clean trowel or spoon. Serving ideas: Since the crushed Oreos look like real dirt you can put flowers in the "dirt" in the pot, rocks on the "dirt" in the pot or hide gummy worms in the "dirt cake." Use your imagination!


