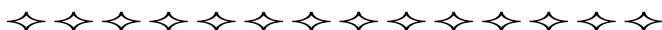

## Are You Ready for the Newest Gemstone?

What do you get when you mix a bright green peridot with a blue-green tourmaline? Tashmarine, of course. Eric Braunwart says his company, Columbia Gem House, Vancouver, WA, chose the mellifluous name of the new gemstone and he hopes that with proper marketing, good supply and marketable sizes, the gem is on a fast track to join tanzanite, tsavorite and Paraiba tourmaline in a select group of newer world-class gemstones.

Gemologically, the gem is diopside, and it's from a deposit near Tashkent in eastern Uzbekistan. Diopside, mostly originating in Russia, has been gaining popularity as a gem in recent years, particularly because its deep green is reminiscent of the finest green tourmaline – at a fraction of the price. But gemologists are also quick to point out the gem's weakness: cleavage planes. Improperly cut or set, or if dealt a hard knock, the gem is prone to sudden parting along these planes. The gem is neither treated nor enhanced in any way. Tashmarine is far lighter and brighter than most other fine and commercial diopside. Smaller gems (up to 7 carats for manufacturers) are faceted in large quantities to optimize color and light return.

Tashmarine is a non-chromium colored form of green diopside. It is uniquely colored by iron which results in lighter and brighter colors when compared to its more popular sister stone, chrome diopside. Chrome diopside is

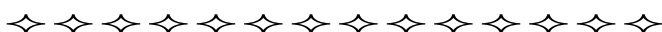

the best-known gemstone variety of diopside, and it is by far the most popular diopside used in the jewelry trade. As its name suggests, chrome diopside obtains its attractive color from chromium. With chrome diopside, its forest-green color tends to darken as its size increases, with many larger stones often appearing near-black, but with Tashmarine this is not the case. In fact, there are many Tashmarine gems weighing 40 carats or more with excellent color. Currently, there are several fine pieces of faceted Tashmarine on display in the Smithsonian Institution of Washington D.C.

**DIRECTIONS TO SITE** – Take Highway I-80 East to Verdi, Nv. Take exit 2 towards Verdi. Turn right onto 3<sup>rd</sup> St. Turn right onto Crystal Park Rd, then turn right. Crystal Peak Park, 561 Crystal Park Rd, Verdi, NV 89439.

**OTHER REMARKS** – This is the perfect trip for someone just getting started in collecting rocks in the field. You can find quality Quartz Crystals with a bit of digging. Bring a camera, this is an area for good pictures.



## 26-Pound Nugget Proved a Sure Cure for Gold Fever

From the Egyptians and Spanish conquistadors to the Lost Dutchman Mine or any of the Indiana Jones films, treasure hunting holds an unquenchable fascination.

In 1989, a Mexican following that passion decided to search a portion of the Sonoran Desert about 70 miles south of Arizona. There had been reports of gold nuggets having been found there some years earlier. Might there be more?

The modern-day searcher set up a search grid and patiently swept the site for several weeks, finding only metal scrap and a few old lead bullets.

One afternoon, his patience paid off. The “beep” from the detector was louder than most. He dug down and spotted something shiny. He had to keep digging, as the object was considerably larger than a bullet — more than 10 inches tall and 7 inches wide.

Eventually he uncovered a rock. It weighed over 26 pounds, so lifting it wasn't easy. That suggested it might contain a fair amount of gold. Once home, he washed off the dust. The gleaming mass was virtually solid gold, containing almost 3990 troy ounces. It was later assayed as 94 percent pure.

The discovery became known as the Boot of Cortez due to its shape. To this day, it remains the largest gold nugget found in the Western Hemisphere. (The second largest is 100 ounces smaller.). The Boot of Cortez was sold and has been owned by several people. It has also been on display at various exhibits including the American Museum of Natural History in New York.

Last month, the nugget - if you can still call it that-was put up for sale at Heritage Auction Galleries in Texas. The hamper price was \$1,553,500, or roughly \$4,000 per ounce.

The Buyer of the Boot of Cortez is an American philanthropist who “wishes to see it return to public display in the very near future.”

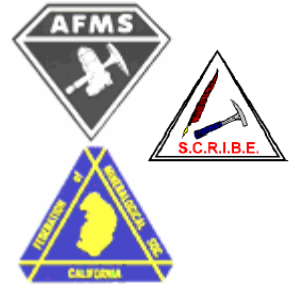
