## MINUTES FOR ROSEVILLE ROCK ROLLERS BOARD MEETING SEPTEMBER 27, 2022

Call to Order – by Glenn Fiala, President, at 7:00 p.m.

- **Roll Call** a quorum was present, absent: Jim Barton, Holli Hinkle, Martha Nichols, Terry Yoschak; guests present: Kim Fiala, Gloria Marie and Les Holbrook.
- **Minutes** A motion was MSA to approve the minutes for: Board Meeting June 28, Ed. & Bd. Mtg. July 12, Ed. & Bd. Mtg. August 9 and Ed. Mtg. Sept. 13, 2022.
- **Treasurer**: Bills Terry Yoschak was absent. It was reported the insurance for Directors & Officers of \$275 was paid.
- Cathy Nelson agreed to help Florence collect membership renewals at the Oct. 11<sup>th</sup> Ed. Mtg.
- **Secretary** Florence Brady sent around a possible order for the CFMS triangles and bars for Officers for 2022.
- **Correspondence** Florence reported none.
- **Membership** Florence stated we have 255 members. A motion was MSA to approve for this year and 2023, membership for Tehani Hogan. Discussion on membership reinstatement for a member who had his membership terminated. Membership renewals for 2023 will start with the form in the October bulletin.
- **Vice President/Program** the program for Oct. 11<sup>th</sup> Ed. Mtg. will be a presentation by Dick Hilton on Dinosaurs in CA.
- Librarian Historian Karla Shannon had no report.

Deadline for Bulletin - Friday, Sept. 30, 2022.

- **Field Trip** Gene Doyle reported there will be the upcoming Oct. 22 & 23 field trip to the Hawthorne area. He is considering options for a field trip in November. Discussion on the upcoming proposed closure of the Bear River Campground. This was used as the access point for past field trips to the Bear River.
- **Federation Director** Barbara Louden, reported she will be attending the CFMS meeting in Visalia. Incoming CFMS Director for 2023, Megan Zbierski will also be invited to attend. Kim Fiala will be installed as CFMS President. It was decided to place a textbox in each RRR bulletin, inviting members to go to the CFMS website and read the monthly CFMS newsletter. Barbara will research AFMS for information regarding Juniors.
- **Lapidary Classes** Cathy Nelson reported on the wire wrapping class which was held Sept. 24<sup>th</sup>. Discussion regarding types of future wire wrapping classes. She has one opening for the silversmithing class on October 9<sup>th</sup>.
- Show Jim Hutchings presented information regarding the proposed contract from the Fairgrounds for a show on August 3-6, 2023. Discussed was the increase by \$7,600 for renting half of the Event Center building, and ways this increase could be met by adding more vendors, possible increase in table rental fee and absorbing some of this cost from the profit made. "We are being "weaned" off of the discount in rental fees, the FG's gave us for 2022 Show. Existing policy for choosing type of vendors was shared. Last year's attendance was 100 less than our "record" attendance and our profit was higher than our highest previous profit. As we are a nonprofit organization, how much do we really need to make? A motion was MSA to approve holding the 2023 show and accept the proposal. The Show Committee will decide what steps need to be taken, to deal with this increase in rental fees. Members were encouraged to attend upcoming shows, talk to possible vendors, possibly recruit vendors, take a photo of what they are selling.

**Lapidary Shop** - Denise Coyne – discussed the problems with connecting to the City's sewer pipe. Glenn was asked to talk

to the personnel at the Fairgrounds and he will try to contact Roebbelen and see if they have any information on what was previously done. Sherri and Tom Collins will be instructors for a daytime period on Thursdays. It will be an open shop and also have instructions available. Exterior doors need to be replaced, fiberglass, pre-hung doors should be used. Profits (\$6,000) from the Tailgater are to be used for their payment. If painting the exterior is done, a reflective type of paint which is rolled on, should be used. Roof needs to be checked for cracks, no leaking noticed during last rain storm. Rock Shed needs to be caulked at the edges. The Covid mandates need to be removed from the website and bulletin. Will still keep classes at 5-6 students, with attendees calling ahead of time. A date needs to be set for cleaning up the Storage Shed.

# **Rookie Rock Roller News**



The Rookies will meet in the Lapidary Shop on Tuesday, October 11 from 5:30 to 6:45. The entrance is located on 200 Corporation Yard Road. The Rookie program is designed for children 8-17 years of age. I am

finding that children younger than that need extra support to fully participate. Parents of children under the age of 8 must stay with their child to provide the extra support as needed.

In October, the Rookies will be working on the Earth Processes badge by learning about weathering and erosion and how they fit into the Rock Cycle. In November we will be finishing the Collecting Badge. Any Rookies who want to earn the badge must report on their collections to demonstrate they understand how to build, store, and label a collection of rocks, minerals, and fossils.

On October 30 we have a field trip for just the Rookies. Don Tadlock has invited the Rookies to come to his house to search for rocks in his rock garden and to see and hear about his fluorescent rocks. It is scheduled for 2:00 pm. Don has requested that each child is accompanied by a parent.

Over the last few months, the Rookies have been working on two badges from the Future Rockhounds of American Badge Program. The first is Earth Processes and second is Collecting. Some of the Juniors are very close to finishing these badges. In December we will start working on the Rocks and Minerals badge. Rookies who attend most of the meetings should be able to earn the badge. I will make sure that there is enough repetition and review that it will not be necessary to attend all the meetings to earn the badges. The Rookies are also able to work on these or other badges on their own. Just let me know when they finish a badge, and I will go over it with them.

If you run into such vendors, grab their card and a picture of their materials, if they will allow it. We can also consider exceptional, hand fabricated or original designed jewelry.

We learned so much about holding a full show at the Event Center, and it should be a piece of cake next year! Join us on February 21, 2023, for our Show formation meeting, and help us plan for one of the greatest shows in California!

## **'SQUASH BLOSSOM' (?) NECKLACE**

Did you know that the "blossoms" are not squash, but are stylized versions of the pomegranate flower or it's immature fruit, and, that the design originated in Mediterranean countries, and, that the pomegranate configuration, a common Spanish motif, probably came with the Spaniards to Mexico where it was adopted by the Mexican platero (silversmiths)? The crescent shaped pendant, the naja, was brought to the Indian territory by Spaniards, probably as bridal ornaments.

The crescent has long been used by different nations. The Moors, a people of mixed Berber & Arab blood, still use the crescent as a good luck charm. The Moors carried the crescent to the Spanish Peninsulas, and the Spanish married it to the Americas. These symbols have no cultural significance to the Native American and are no more than beautiful art forms.
