MINUTES FOR ROSEVILLE ROCK ROLLERS EDUCATIONAL MEETING DECEMBER 12, 2023

- CALL TO ORDER: Vice President Vern Deck called the meeting to order at 6:34 p.m.
- FLAG SALUTE: Vice President Vern Deck led the Pledge of Allegiance.
- ATTENDANCE: Present were 41 adult members, 9 juniors, and 5 guests.
- INVOCATION: Vice President Vern Deck led the prayer for the blessing before the meal.
- POTLUCK DINNER: Steve Smith and Elizabeth Cheairs prepared turkey breasts, and Jim Hutchings prepared the ham. Vice President Vern Deck called each table to line up.
- BUSINESS MEETING:
- SUNSHINE Chair Heather Crane was absent, and no report was given.
- JUNIORS Juniors' Advisor Patty Holbrook reported 8 juniors attended the meeting. Les Holbrook gave a presentation on his recent trip to New Mexico, sharing samples of specimens he collected. Juniors learned about borax, petrified wood, and the geology of the Red Rock Canyon State Park. During the January meeting, Florence Brady will present her fossil collection from Germany.
- TREASURER Treasurer Kim Fiala reported the income and expenditures from November 1st through December 10th. Total income from memberships, lapidary shop, silent auction, and donations was \$2,046.50. Total expenditure was \$3,319.73. Expenditures included rent \$1,700, utilities \$200.34, insurance \$403.87, DOJ raffle fee \$30, USPS P.O. Box \$194, lapidary equipment and supplies \$741.75, refreshments \$40.93, member badges \$8.84)
- MEMBERSHIP Secretary Florence Brady reported a total of 268 members. Two joined since last meeting. 150 renewed for 2024. Accepting renewals for 2024 membership. Renewal dues not paid by December 31st will be delinquent and will incur an assessment of \$5.
- VICE PRESIDENT Vice President Vern Deck reported the program for the January Educational Meeting will be a presentation by Gary Carter on the Vulture Gold Mine in Arizona.
- CFMS Federation Director Meg Zbierski was absent, and no report was given.

In Our Society: The Economic Importance of Garnet

"Garnets have been used as gemstones for thousands of years, and with other red gems were often collectively known as carbuncles. Garnets' color, hardness, and transparency make them attractive stones for use in jewelry, but they are generally too common to be prized as high-quality gems. Presently, garnet's main economic value derives from its hardness and lack of cleavage, which makes it an excellent abrasive. As an abrasive, garnet is primarily used as a loose-grain abrasive in air blasting or water jet cutting. In sand blasting operations, garnet sand is a safer alternative than the more traditional silica (quartz) sand because of the greater health risks of inhaling airborne silica dust. Fine garnet dust is used in the detailed finishing and polishing of optical lens, plate glass, and semiconductor materials. Garnet grains may also be affixed to materials as coated abrasives, and if you work with wood, you almost certainly have purchased sandpaper made of garnet grains. Because garnet is chemically stable, it is also used as a filtering medium for water purification systems or wastewater treatment plants."

Fun Facts About Garnet

- Garnet is January's birthstone as well as the gemstone for the 2nd wedding anniversary.
- Garnets form at high temperature and pressure.
- Garnet rates as 6.5-7.5 on the Moh's hardness scale.
- The name "garnet" comes from the Latin word granatus, which means "seed-like" and refers to its pomegranate seed-like look.
- The term "garnet" actually refers to a variety of gemstones that all share a similar crystal structure, but the chemical composition varies due to different ions.
- The garnet group includes almandine, grossular, andradite, spessartine, pyrope, and uvarovite.
